LETTER FROM THE CEO

At Moral Compass Federation, we move forward together. Guided by our mission to empower veteran communities to address moral injury through education, advocacy, and convening, we've built a coalition-based model that reflects our core values: amplifying voices of veteran leadership, honoring promises to our foreign partners, taking care of those who took care of this country, and promoting sound policies to prevent future crises. Since our founding, these principles have driven our efforts to create meaningful, measurable change.

This year, our work spanned critical areas, from direct humanitarian aid to shaping national dialogue and policy. We supported over 10,000 Afghan allies and engaged nearly 1,000 veterans, creating meaningful connections that foster healing and transformation. Through initiatives like the **Vets Welcoming Allies Program**, we addressed the resettlement challenges faced by Afghan SOF veterans while giving U.S. veterans opportunities to heal through service.

Our advocacy efforts have been instrumental in shaping policy at the highest levels. We conducted over 70 engagements with lawmakers and executive branch agencies, briefed the George W. Bush Presidential Center on veteran and foreign partner issues, and laid the groundwork for state-level policy change in Nevada, focusing on rural veteran health and drone operator mental wellness. As a key contributor to the House Foreign Affairs Committee's investigation into the

Afghanistan withdrawal, we ensured that the experiences of servicemembers and Afghan allies were documented and heard, helping to create a record that will inform future decisions.

In 2023, we launched the Moral Injury Network, bringing together a coalition of ten organizations to tackle moral injury through education, research, and advocacy. With efforts ranging from alternative therapies to peer-to-peer counseling to data collection, this node is poised to drive groundbreaking advancements in understanding and treating moral injury. The Moral Injury Network establishes a blueprint for new initiatives in 2025 and beyond.

We also continued to amplify voices and foster dialogue through thought leadership. From the Military Women's Memorial's Health & Wellness Series to the Global Friends of Afghanistan Conference, we convened experts, advocates, and veterans to address pressing issues around mental health, moral injury, and Afghanistan's future.

These efforts reflect the heart of MCF: a coalition united in purpose, driven by compassion, and committed to action. The pages that follow highlight the milestones we've achieved, the lives we've touched, and the groundwork we've laid for an even more impactful future.

OUR MISSION


Moral Compass Federation empowers veteran communities by addressing moral injury through a coalition-based model, bringing together veteran-led organizations and taking action on critical issues affecting the veteran community. We amplify members' voices through media engagements, Congressional testimonies, and strategic partnerships to create lasting, positive change.

WHAT IS MORAL INJURY?

Moral injury is the lasting emotional, psychological, social, behavioral, and spiritual impacts of actions that violate a service member's core moral values and behavioral expectations of self or others (Litz et al., 2009). It is damage done to one's moral compass and the third leg in the hidden wounds triad: PTS, TBI, and Moral Injury.

OUR ORIGINS

MCF was formed in the wake of the Afghanistan collapse. Individuals and organizations came together to right a wrong and ensure we kept the promises made to our foreign partners. Since then, we've become a network resource to take care of Veterans and align likeminded Veteran Service Organizations.



HONORING SACRIFICE AND SUPPORTING HEALING

Moral Compass Federation partnered with Operation Allies Refuge (OAR) to raise \$50,000 during a Remembrance Dinner at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C. that honored the 13 servicemembers who lost their lives in the Abbey Gate Bombing in 2021. MFC proudly sponsored the travel and attendance of eight Gold Star families, ensuring they could join this meaningful gathering at no cost. The dinner attracted roughly 250 attendees, approximately one-third were combat veterans, representing the core of the GWOT generation.

The event, held August 23, 2023, served not only as a remembrance but also as a fundraiser for OAR's vital work. Through storytelling workshops, peer-to-peer engagement, direct assistance to Afghan allies, and data collection for research into the impact of moral injury on the Global War on Terror (GWOT) generation, OAR continues to be a leading veteran organization in addressing the unseen wounds of war.





MORAL INJURY NETWORK

Moral Compass Federation officially launched its Moral Injury Network, the second neural node in our expanding network of member organizations dedicated to addressing moral injury, in Fall 2023. This innovative node brings together eight new member organizations and expands connections for two existing organizations, each tackling moral injury from unique and complementary perspectives.

Diverse Approaches to Healing

- Heroes Journey: Teaching veterans to heal through storytelling, this organization empowers individuals to find their voice and share their experiences of war, transforming trauma into connection and understanding.
- Project Rebirth: Operating the largest certified peer specialist program in the nation, Project Rebirth matches trained, on-call veterans with peers in need, building a robust network of mutual support.
- NOVA Pax Wellness & VAHA: These
 organizations lead the charge in exploring
 alternative treatments for moral injury,
 offering clinician-guided retreats and
 programs focused on processing
 psychedelic experiences as a pathway to
 healing.

Together with other organizations that promote healing through experiential practices, advocacy, education, and research, the Moral Injury Network is shaping a comprehensive ecosystem of care for veterans impacted by moral injury.

Laying the Foundation for Growth

The node held a two-day offsite in Las Vegas, NV, uniting member organizations for strategic planning. This gathering set three key priorities for 2024-2025:

- Education: Raising awareness and equipping veterans, clinicians, and communities with tools to address it.
- Research: Collaborating with experts to define moral injury as distinct from PTS and TBI
- Advocacy: Advancing national dialogue and creating a Hidden Wounds Congressional Caucus by 2025.









HEALING THROUGH CONNECTION

The Vets Welcoming Allies Program, funded by the largest single Afghanistan-related grant from Welcome.US, created a shared space for healing and growth by addressing moral injury among U.S. veterans and supporting Afghan Special Operations Forces (SOF) veterans and their families in overcoming critical resettlement challenges. The program directly impacted thousands of lives, engaging 1000 U.S. veterans and 10,000 Afghan allies and their families, and demonstrated the transformative potential of leveraging the veteran ecosystem to lead.

Hours of Engagement Focusing on employment opportunities and social-emotional wellness, the program bridged the unique bond between Afghan and U.S. veterans. Through needs assessment and geographic mapping, workforce development and training, and anti-isolation pilots with mentorship groups, the program provided Afghan newcomers with the tools to integrate into their communities and U.S. veterans with meaningful ways to heal through service.

By creating trust and fostering collaboration, the Vets Welcoming Allies Program proved that resettlement can serve as a powerful pathway for veterans to find purpose, closure, and renewed connections. Together, this initiative exemplified the strength of community and the potential to drive change at the intersection of service and healing.

LIFE-SAVING AID IN CRISIS

This year, Moral Compass Federation, through innovative delivery and sheer willpower by member organizations Aces and Eights and CEEC Church, delivered 303 humanitarian aid packages to Afghan allies in safehouses under dire conditions. These packages included essential supplies like bulk food, clothing, and firewood, directly supporting 1,515 individuals awaiting evacuation.





This coordinated effort ensured survival out of sight, providing warmth, sustenance, and hope during a period of immense uncertainty. The work highlights the Federation's ability to mobilize resources and deliver life-saving support, exemplifying its mission to address moral injury and humanitarian crises through decisive action.

BUILDING STRONGER FUTURES

At Moral Compass Federation, we believe that the successful integration of Afghan youth is a cornerstone for entire families to thrive in the United States. Over the past two years, we proudly supported two annual flagship events led by our member organizations and partners, **REACT DC**, **Travis Manion Foundation**, and **The Blackfeather Foundation**, which have made a lasting impact on hundreds of Afghan children and their families.



REACT DC and Travis Manion Foundation's Back-to-School Event:

For two consecutive years, REACT DC and Travis Manion Foundation hosted a **Back-to-School event**, each year providing **500 children** with backpacks filled with essential school supplies. This initiative ensured Afghan youth were equipped for success in the classroom, alleviating financial stress on families. The event also offered an afternoon of food and outdoor activities, fostering community connections for the entire family.

The Blackfeather Foundation's Youth Sports Days:

Partnering with the Washington
Commanders, The Blackfeather
Foundation hosted Youth Sports Days,
engaging 150 Afghan youth and their
guardians each year in a full day of
outdoor recreation, sports, and
camaraderie. These events not only
promoted physical activity but also
strengthened community ties through
the participation of dedicated
volunteers.



Both initiatives went beyond providing direct support to Afghan youth. They created spaces for families to bond, communities to grow, and veterans to heal. For GWOT generation veterans, these events offered an opportunity to address moral injury by sharing family time with Afghan Allies and experiencing the joy of shared laughter and connection.

FORGING STRONG STATE AND FEDERAL RELATIONSHIPS

ADVANCING CHANGE THROUGH COLLABORATION

Moral Compass Federation has been at the forefront of advocacy, engaging policymakers and leaders across government and nonprofit sectors to drive meaningful change. This year, we conducted **over 70 engagements** with legislators from both sides of the aisle and executive branch agencies, including the Department of State and the CARE office.

Our commitment to a **nonpartisan approach**, guided by our core tenets, has positioned us as a trusted voice in these critical conversations. This approach has already paved the way for significant opportunities in 2025.

In addition to our work on Capitol Hill, we were honored to brief the George W. Bush Presidential Center, a nonpartisan institution advancing the timeless values of freedom, opportunity, accountability, and compassion. We engaged directly with their Directors of Immigration and Veteran Affairs,



successfully highlighting our progress and sharing our vision for the future. We look forward to a **follow-up engagement in 2025**, further strengthening this partnership.

At the state level, the **Nevada League of Cities** invited MCF to discuss veteran and service member issues at their annual conference. By forging key relationships with local leaders, we will begin to lay the groundwork for state-level policy changes. Nevada is a critical state to engage due to its unique challenges, including **rural veteran health disparities** and the role of **drone operators** at Creech Air Force Base. By focusing on these pressing issues, we aim to create impactful solutions that can serve as a model for other states.

Through these strategic engagements, MCF continues to amplify the voices of our coalition, shape policy, and build the networks needed to address the critical challenges facing veterans and Afghan allies. Together, we are advancing change at every level, from local communities to the national stage.

TESTIFYING FOR TRUTH:

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE AFGHANISTAN WITHDRAWAL INVESTIGATION

Moral Compass Federation played a pivotal role in the House Foreign Affairs Committee's investigation into the withdrawal from Afghanistan. Leveraging our network of leaders, partners, and supporters, we **prepared 14 individuals to testify** before the full committee and roundtables. Their testimonies shed light on the conditions surrounding the withdrawal and evacuation, the profound impact on servicemembers and their families since 2021, and the ongoing threats faced by Afghan allies left behind.




MCF led a **delegation of seven representatives** to participate in a roundtable on **Taliban reprisals** in January 2024, providing critical oral testimony and submitting **hundreds of pages of records** documenting threats and atrocities committed against Afghan allies. These accounts were indispensable in creating a comprehensive understanding of the human cost of the withdrawal and the continuing challenges faced by those most affected.



TESTIFYING FOR TRUTH:

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE AFGHANISTAN WITHDRAWAL INVESTIGATION



The Federation's contributions were prominently featured in the **final report of the two-year investigation**, which cited our statistics and firsthand accounts extensively. **CEO Timothy Torres** was directly quoted in the report, emphasizing the credibility and impact of our advocacy. This report not only serves as a historical record but also as a roadmap for shaping more informed and humane policies in the future.

MCF is proud to have helped establish a **ground truth** surrounding the withdrawal and its aftermath, both in the United States and abroad. By ensuring the voices of service members, families, and Afghan allies are heard, we hope to influence future decisions, fostering accountability and better outcomes for all those impacted by conflict.

THOUGHT LEADERSHIP:

SHAPING THE FUTURE THROUGH ADVOCACY AND DIALOGUE

This year, Moral Compass Federation solidified its role as a thought leader with events focused on two key areas: the future of Afghanistan and addressing moral injury in veterans. Through direct participation, expert panelist contributions, and event funding, MCF helped elevate key discussions and foster collaboration across diverse sectors.

OUR 2025 GOALS

1

Collect critical data on GWOT veteran moral injury.

MCF will host the Moral Injury Outcome Scale (MIOS)—the foremost self-report questionnaire for measuring moral injury—on an accessible platform to empower member organizations to deploy MIOS within their programs. The aggregated data will be shared across member organizations and with key research partners, ensuring that the ground truth of moral injury's prevalence and impact in the GWOT generation is brought to light.

By informing research and advocacy, MCF seeks to **drive progress** in understanding moral injury and shaping policies and interventions that meet veterans' needs.



Advance relocation and resettlement for our most trusted and vetted Afghan allies.

MCF remains steadfast in its commitment to the relocation and resettlement of our most trusted and vetted Afghan allies. We will continue leveraging our coalition's expertise and bolstering their program resources. As a 2025 Welcome Corps Consortium member, we will support veterans' ability to name and privately sponsor Afghans and honor promises made to our allies.

2

Successfully advocate for a Hidden Wounds Congressional Caucus.

MCF is committed to driving legislative action to support veterans by establishing a "Hidden Wounds" Caucus in Congress to focus on examining and advancing policy solutions to address the hidden wounds triad—Post-Traumatic Stress (PTS), Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), and Moral Injury—affecting GWOT veterans.

The caucus will explore legislative and policy initiatives that improve diagnosis, treatment, and long-term support for veterans.

Establish a Crisis Response Network to bring GWOT expertise to global crises.

Afghanistan response playbook, MCF will
establish a Crisis Response Network to
connect organizations that have
consistently responded to domestic and
international emergencies—whether
driven by climate, conflict, or other
destabilizing forces. The Crisis Response
Network will ensure that critical
assistance is delivered swiftly and
effectively wherever it is needed.
